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

I am delighted to say that our building works have finished. The children are now well established in their new classroom and loving every minute of it. It is bright, airy and a pleasure to both teach and learn in. Thank you to everyone involved in the build and, in particular, to all those of you who have been so generous in contributing to our 'Donate a Brick' appeal. We are most grateful.

Although we said a sad farewell to Tony and Pauline Topp, the children gave them a 'royal' goodbye with each class presenting them with cards and a song or poem to wish them well in their retirement. You may have seen our new cleaner/caretaker around in the village, Andy Brooks, as he cleans the school every evening.



The past two terms have been full of events not least our SIAMS (Church) inspection in which we were judged as 'good' with two out of the four areas of the school being judged as 'outstanding' namely the school's Christian distinctiveness and impact of Collective Worship. The report recognised the very positive relationship we have with the Church and I am grateful to all the Clergy as well as the Open the Book team for all that they do for our school. The highlight of the report was the fact that the children were recognised as being able to 'confidently express measured, reasoned opinions about a broad range of matters while also showing high respect for those whose views may differ.' A key part of the inspection was based on the values we have chosen for our school which are Respect, Kindness and Perseverance.

During the last two terms, we have been busy. Our older children enjoyed a wonderful Ancient Greek Day, during which they moved from class to class working on a number of activities including printing classical patterns, using clay to make Greek pendants and acting out Greek myths and legends.

At the beginning of March, the staff held a fantastic World Book Day. The children worked in their house teams on book-themed activities. These included: Roald Dahl's Revolting Recipes where the children made Troll's Burnt Blister juice, Mouse Dropping and Dirt pie and Eye-ball biscuits; using Van Gogh as inspiration for superhero art; making and filming superheroes and villains out of vegetables based on the stories of 'Supertato' by Sue Henra; and acting out the wonderful poem from Burglar Bill by Janet and Alan Ahlberg.

We also attended the Dance Festival at St John's where a group of children danced beautifully and our thanks must go to their teacher for giving up her time to teach the children the dance and for taking them to the event.

Our Easter celebrations culminated in a wonderful celebration of the Easter story in Church as well as an excellent Easter Eggstravaganza kindly organized by the Friends of Baydon School. Despite the weather, the event was really well supported and thanks to all those involved.





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Thanks to Ramsbury Estates, four of our classes have enjoyed trips to their farm where they enjoyed learning about the crops and wildlife, riding on a trailer and planting out cowslips as part of a butterfly conservation project which many schools in the local area have taken part in.

We continue to get involved in local PE tournaments. The year 6s have attended a hockey competition; the year 4s a cricket festival and the year 5s a rounders festival. Our year 6s continue to act as Sports Leaders during these events.



We were very proud of a group of our year 5 children who attended a maths competition at Pinewood Preparatory School. The children were a credit to our school and we congratulate them for doing so well in what was a very close competition

We are sorry to be saying goodbye to Mrs Osborne who runs Wagtails, our after school club. She retires at the end of the summer term and we are currently advertising for her replacement. Please do pass the word around and let us know if you are interested.

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
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Bake Off for Lift Off is our theme for National Air Ambulance Week, 10 – 16 September 2018.

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An introduction to the Ramsbury Flyer Community Bus

The Ramsbury 'Flyer' is run by volunteers within the village of Ramsbury and other local communities. It has been in existence since 1993. Ramsbury Community Transport, which operates The Flyer, became a registered charity in 2014. The 'Flyer' provides reasonably priced transport for all ages and is used by local clubs and societies as well as for regular scheduled services. On our scheduled shopping services, bus passes can be used.



The day to day costs of running the Flyer are paid for by the grants from local authorities, donations and revenue from private and community hire.

The aim of the Flyer is to provide affordable and convenient transport to the residents of Ramsbury and surrounding villages, complimenting other forms of public transport.

We have a number of regular services, which include:

- Transport to and from the Ramsbury Surgery Tuesday & Thursday mornings The Flyer visits local villages, including Ramsbury, Baydon, Aldbourne, Axford, Mildenhall, Froxfield and Chilton Foliat, picking up residents at a central place and taking them to and from the Ramsbury Surgery for their appointments. In order to use this free service, simply mention this to the Receptionist when booking your appointment at the Surgery.
- Scheduled service to Hungerford Wednesday & Friday mornings. See Flyer Scheduled Services Timetable on our website and displayed in bus shelters -Bus passes can be used

Wednesday: shopping trip to Hungerford, collecting from Ramsbury, Chilton Foliat and Froxfield.

Friday: shopping trip to Hungerford, collecting from Aldbourne, Ramsbury and Froxfield

- Scheduled service to Marlborough 1st and 3rd Wednesday of the month. See Flyer Scheduled Services Timetable on our website and displayed in bus shelters - Bus passes can be used
- **Newbury shopping Excursion** 2nd Thursday each month. Regular excursion into Newbury leaves the square in Ramsbury at 11.30am. You can be collected from Back Lane, Axford, Ramsbury High Street and Aldbourne this is not a scheduled service so bus passes cannot be accepted. The current fare £4.00. Please phone Janet on 01672 520682 to reserve your place

The 'Flyer' can also be hired to community organisations and private individuals at very competitive rates. See our website for more information – <u>www.ramsburyflyer.org</u>. Great send off for "Pete the Postie"

At the end of March we said goodbye and good luck to our very popular postman Pete, who retired after nine years of delivering our mail. A large crowd gathered in Baydon PO and Stores for a "surprise" farewell for Pete (but of course he knew it was going on!). Tea and cake were served and Pete was presented with a booksigned by villagers, ful of well wishes and also an amazing painting of the village aby villager Annie Welsh. He also receivedmoney collected from donations by villagers. Hopefully for Pete to use for a break with his wife.

The Scene caught-up with Pete for a quick interview :

Has Pete always been a Postman?

No, only for 16 years,. Before this he was in the



Merchant Navy, but lef ythe Navy to get married. He has known his wife since they were teenagers. He then joined Bell-Fruit as a service engineer. When Bell-Fruit relocated he didn't want to uproot his family and move. He saw a position as postman and applied, believing it would "see him over for a while".

What is it like being a postman in Baydon?

Pete described the villagers of Baydon as "the kindest, friendliest, most generous people he has ever met." There are 388 delivery points on the Baydon Round (it also includes Russley Park). Pete made an effort from day one to know not only the surnames of the people on his route, but also first names where possible ((even the dogs!), and also their preferences for parcel deliveries when they were out. He has always been willing to stop and chat to people, especially those on their own, as he may be the only person they see that day. Perhaps it his dedication to providing an excellent service that has enabled him to see the best of Baydon villagers.

How has the job changed over the 16 years?

The job is the same, but management has changed. Letter delivery has declined demendously and continues to do so, but parcel delivery continues to grow, thank to online shopping. Pete fears we may eventually move to a system of centralise collection points only in the future.

What is your plan for the future?

Pete may do dome part-time work, possibly on a local estate.

Pete has been a wonderful postman and part of our community over the last 16 years and we wish him and his wife a very happy retirement.





WHEN IS A "VILLAGE HALL" NOT A VILLAGE HALL?

The decision was made by the BYPA Hall committee to ask for signs pointing to the hall to help with future hiring of the hall. They felt that no one would know what a BYPA Hall was, so in their wisdom they requested "Village Hall" signs.

BYPA stands for Baydon Young Peoples Association, and this name was first mentioned in an old minute book at a Management meeting held after the AGM on 5th January, 1948 in the schoolroom. The Hall actually belongs to the youth of the village, not the whole village.

We hope to explain why:-

In 1978 two new residents in Downs mead attended a Parish Meeting to ask why there was no village hall, and whether something could be done about it. At that point the school was used for meetings, but could not be used, obviously, during the day. The Council replied that they should research the subject and see if there was any support for such a building. They visited everyone in Baydon with a questionnaire. It was amazing what they discovered about the history of the village, and the enthusiasm for such a project. They duly took their findings back to the Parish Assembly.

The story started with a Conveyance dated the 14th December 1949, when the land on which the present Hall sits was given to the youth of the village, between Mr Edwin Smith of Larges Farm, Blunden, Farmer, (the Vendor) and Mr. Leonard George Adler of The Stores, Baydon, Provision Merchant, Mr Walter Henry Hunt of Westfield Farm, Farmer and James Ernest Minty of Hardwicke, Baydon, Gentleman (the Trustees) for the education and entertainment of the young people of Baydon. This document is now with the Charities Commission.

In the 1949 meeting it was mentioned that there had been difficulties in obtaining a building licence, but that permission to start work had just been received. In the minutes of the meeting held on the 24th June, 1948 there is mention of it being held in" The Headquarters". This obviously refers to the Nissan hut erected on the site, where older members of the village remembered holding dances, but this Hut had since fallen into disrepair.

In 1976 the only thing on the site was a concrete plinth and a solitary white toil et. Not long afterwards Roger Forster and Roy Canning obtained a wooden building from Bedford that had originally been a farm chicken shed, and this was erected on this plinth. A set of steps led from Manor Lane up the right hand side of the land to this Hut, and a youth club was started, run by an activities committee.

Unfortunately some time later, during the period between Christmas and New Year, the wooden hut was burnt down. Whilst the insurance was being sorted out and a massive fundraising effort was started, the youth club moved to one of Roger's barns at Baydon Hole Farm and was run by a committee. A couple of barn dances were held in this barn to raise money and the village was asked, and very generously gave, to this fundraising effort.

When enough money had been raised, the Marley building was ordered, but before its arrival the grounds had to be landscaped. The old concrete base was demolished; the site lowered, and as part of the planning consent, a driveway and car park was dug out.

Once the Marley building finally arrived onsite a group of dedicated volunteers set out to insulate it, fit out the kitchen, toilets, lighting, heating, and finally painting inside and out. When this was completed, the retaining walls, steps, and garden had to be completed. All this work was carried out by an amazingly small team of very kind, energetic and community minded people and their children who turned out in all weathers, weekend after weekend to get the job done. At the same time fundraising continued to pay for it all!! A new application to be registered as a charity was applied for and was successful, and several grants were also obtained to pay for some of the ongoing work.

At this point two committees were formed, one was a building committee and the other was formed to organise activities for the young people. Each of these committees was made up of about a dozen people, one or two of whom were on both committees.

Finally the Hall was officially opened by Mrs Pembroke in October 1989 and the Youth Club was up and running in the village once again. The activities committee ran a varied programme of events as well as a very popular tuckshop. The children played their records, pool, darts, and table tennis and generally enjoyed themselves. At its heyday there were three different age groups running each week. The children joined in County events, reaching the National Quiz finals, played badminton, hockey, pool, cricket and football at venues all over the County. A gas barbecue was bought for the club as well as being hired out for private functions such as the village fete. A Youth club walk was organised each year over two days, with an overnight stop en route. Alan and Marilyn Brown took some of the children each year to the Youth Afloat weekend on the south coast which was very popular and much enjoyed. They even featured for a couple of seconds on the local South Today news!! Day trips to Alton Towers were organised and much enjoyed by children and adults alike! The Hall boasted three slate pool tables and therefore was in great demand, hosting regional pool tournaments.

During this period the Hall was also hired by various village organisations such as the Thursday Club, the W.I., the Parish Council, and children's parties and funeral teas, but the youth activities always took precedent over other activities. It was also used by the Beavers, Cub, Scouts, Brownies, Toddlers and Pre-school. The toddlers and pre-school were originally held in parent's homes, but later moved to the Hall. The mothers and toddlers gathered there on a Monday and the pre-school ran several sessions a week only closing a year or so ago.

Unfortunately, due to lack of people to run them, a lot of the above clubs have closed, but the Brownies and Toddlers are still going each week and the Parish Council meet several times a year. New clubs have started up in the evenings, such as table tennis, yoga, Zumba. A youth club has just started up again once a month where a variety of activities such as Kaya drumming, graffiti art, sport and party games are featured.

The village is very lucky to have the BYPA Hall, but it must be remembered that it is primarily for the use of the young people. The Hall <u>belongs</u> to them.

The above was put together from the memories of some of the members of the activities and building committees formed in the late seventies and eighties.



From Julie at the Red Lion

Actions speak louder than words: Or to quote the Spice Girls "what do you really, really want?".

All the surveys that have been undertaken formally and informally in Baydon say that you, its residents, want to retain a pub in the village. However my experience as landlady of the Red Lion leads me to question this.

I have a small band of loyal patrons and a wider group of casual visitors but there is a large section of the village that seems never to use the facility that it is apparently so keen to retain. To them I would say (with another cliché) "use it or lose it!".

I am very close to having, due to pure economics, to again reduce opening times. I appreciate this is a negative spiral. Fewer customers leads to reduced hours, reduced hours means fewer customers and the cycle continues toward an inevitable outcome.

If you really want to retain a village pub then it has to be something you go out of your way to use and support. In today's economic situation it can't exist as an abstract concept. Every village should have a church, a shop and yes ...a pub. None of these can possibly survive if people don't, for whatever reason, use them regularly.

If you want to keep the pub open you need to actively and regularly use it. Hopefully the good weather and longer evenings are just around the corner, spend a few at the Red Lion. You are assured of a friendly welcome!"

Trevor Dominy reported that the Firework Committee had held another successful night in November. The committee received training throughout the year. Thanks were extended to Jonathan Smith for the loan of the field, the Parish Council, the Brownies for refreshments, Debbie at the shop and Julie at the Pub,

Father Christmas will, it was promised, be visiting again this year.

The Head of St Nicholas School, Caroline Knighton gave a very extensive report of a "very great year". OFSTED had deemed the school good with the 138 children being "well-mannered and good learners who thought their school was amazing"

The Diocesan inspection gave the school Good with outstanding for 2 of the 4 areas. Mrs Knighton listed the many and varied activities enjoyed by the school through the year. She thanked Ramsbury Estate for their support and help with education trips. She also thanked the "Friends of Baydon School" for their excellent fund raising efforts.

Mrs Knighton mentioned that WAGTAILS were now seeking a new leader for the Breakfast / After School club.

Donni Blackwell as part Church Warden said that there were 21 regular attendees with 64 adults +23 children at Special Services. There had been 4 Baptisms, 1 Marriage and 4 Funerals during the year. She thanked the village for supporting the recent fundraising events.

Nial Cooling said that the Thursday Cycling Club was in its 4th year with 15 members. 2 groups separate and leave the Pub. All are covered by group insurance. The highlight of year was a trip to Cumbria.

Jim Grove spoke for the Baydon Bash Golf Club which has 20 members, but is always open to visitors. Anyone interested should contact Steve Sutton.

The Baydon Young Peoples Association (BYPA) was represented by Gordon Walker. He said that there were 5 volunteers who were mainly involved with the management and maintenance of the Hall at the present time. All were welcome to the AGM the date of which to be announced shortly.

Colin Yeo reported that the Baydon Social Group meets on the 2^{nd} Thursday each month and has had many fun / entertaining activities planned. Anyone interested was welcome to join.

The Table Tennis Club which meets at the hall on a Friday evening has a good group of regulars, reported Bernie Gribble. He thanked the Parish Council for enabling the Club to purchase another table. 4 juniors had now joined and Gordon Walker had been appointed as coach. It was he said a "pay as you play" rather than a subscription.

All new members, especially children, were welcome.

There being no other business the meeting closed at 8.50pm.

BAYDON PARISH ASSEMBLY 2018

The Baydon Parish Assembly was held in the BYPA (Baydon Young Peoples Association) Hall on Friday 11th May 2018. 20 villagers and four councillors were in attendance.

The acting chairperson ClIr Sarah Chidgey welcomed everyone, and gave a short report of the Parish Councils activities through the year. She said that it had been a year of great changes. Firstly the clerk had resigned as had the chair Tamsin Witt and councillor Amy Bryan.

Oliver Armstrong had become the new clerk, she and Sarah Hancock had become councillors.

The Traffic Calming measures had been completed and no new measures will be put into place for about three months. A safety audit will then be made before other traffic calming measures are considered.

The council had received approval to move the 30mph signs further out of the Village towards Aldbourne. The signs would then be at the village gates.

The council were also looking at reducing speed in Manor Lane; therefore a metro count will be conducted.

It had been agreed, ClIr Chidgey added, to have 9 trees to commemorate the WW1 villagers who died, but the PC was waiting for conformation that fruit trees can be used.

The Parish Council had, she said, provided money for the Table Tennis Club, and funded Raffle Tickets for the Village Fete.

The various Christmas Village activities on the Green had been a success thanks to all who had contributed. Cllr Chidgey said the council were also working with the head of Baydon St Nicholas School on "Journey to School".

The letter from Julie, landlady of the Red Lion was read aloud stating "to keep the pub open, villagers need to use it"

Cllr Chidgey emphasised the need for volunteers to become councillors as it was extremely difficult to run with just four people, especially now as the clerk had given in his resignation.

Various reports were given by leaders of groups active in Baydon. Their full reports can be found in the Parish Council minutes.

A report was read from Debbie McDonald leader of the Mother and Toddler group which meets on Monday mornings at the BYPA Hall. 8 families attend at present to enjoy a friendly get together with songs and games.

Wendy Appello from the Brownies pack said that 14 girls attended on a Wednesday evening with 3 qualified leaders. However these 3 leaders need to pass on the leadership of this enthusiastic pack, but are willing to help support in September until new people are trained.

Jenny Gribble spoke for the Baydon Allotment Association say that it had been a challenging year, weather wise, causing late planting. All allotments were being worked, with more flowers being grown to encourage propagation.
