
 12th June 2024. Hands set to 12 noon awaiting clock works coming back from Cumbrian Clock Company in Penrith.

MINISTER'S LETTER

Gosh, it seems to have been a long, cold winter this year! And we've had a couple of "false springs" when it really got quite warm, and I found myself getting excited that spring might, just might, actually arrive – only to be plunged back into grey, grizzly grottiness as a cold front swept in and the clouds filled the sky, swept in by icy winds.

But today, once again, the sun is out and there is a promise of spring in the air. Our damson tree is awash with blossom, and I saw my first little lambs of the year in a field the other day. The bare tree branches are starting to get that haze of colour that means that leaf buds are swelling, with a promise of greenness and growth.

Overflowing Bins

There have been issues with the contractor seemingly not emptying the bins in the parish as often as they are supposed to. The Parish Council directly pay for the emptying of one bin on

Manor Lane and another near the Playing Field.

The Parish Council kindly requests that you do not use bins that are already full or leave rubbish on the ground near a full bin; please find an alternative bin or take your rubbish home with you.

Wiltshire Council Weed Management

Notice from Wiltshire Council regarding Weed Management:

We have been increasing the manual removal of weeds over the past few years, looking to control the weeds on rural verges by flailing and pulling. Our Streetscene teams will remove weeds daily from town centre areas and strim the amenity areas, plus sweepers are used to mechanically remove weeds when cleaning the highway. In addition, Parish Stewards undertake manual weed removal and a small amount of wipe/touch treatment (where weed killer is placed directly onto a leaf).

Although we continue to explore alternative weed treatment methods, chemical applications remain the most effective and efficient method of managing weeds on a large scale. As such, a weed treatment programme will commence on all identified highway land from March 2025. No weed treatment within 50 meters of schools will be undertaken. All treatment applications are licenced, permitted by legislation and applied appropriately. Following a review of alternative treatments, glyphosate will be used, with a touch spray to stop spray drift and uncontrolled application.

Parish Steward Visits

The Parish Steward has filled potholes on the lane that runs past the waste water treatment works and Aldbourne Road, cleaned road signage including 20mph school warning signs and Ermin Street/Manor Lane priority traffic signs, cleared

drainage on Manor Lane Junction and cleared the area around the chicane on Ermin Street.

Please do report any issues that can be dealt with by the Parish Steward. The type of works that can be reported to the Clerk are:

• Hand clearing and cutting of growth from drainage grips and drain gully covers.

After

- Hand clearing of blocked drainage gullies, grips, culverts, pipes and pits (unable to jet).
- Clearing storm debris from roads and footways.
- Pedestrian barriers preparation and painting.
- Cleaning and straightening of small road signs, street nameplates and bollards.
- Securing of existing small road signs, verge marker posts and supplied street name plates.
- Removal of limited graffiti from road signs, bollards and street name plates.
- Hand cutting of grass and vegetation in visibility areas.
- Hand treatment of weeds.
- Hand clearance of encroaching growth and soils from footways.
- Repair of small potholes in roads and footways.

THE APPRENTICE'S TALE

On Monday 4th July 1967 as a naïve 15-year-old I reported to Arthur Mulliner's premises in Bridge Street, Northampton to begin my employment in the motor trade.

I was Vic Bush's new lad. Vic was a nice chap but seemed very old. At the time of course I was oblivious to the fact that Vic had done his apprenticeship in the 1920's. He was a proper old-fashioned mechanic and was quite dismissive of what he called a 'fitter'.

Because Vic was so experienced and highly skilled, he invariably was the man who looked after the glorious older cars such as the Bentleys, Daimlers and Rolls Royce's that still came into Mulliners for repair. He would often make or adapt modern components to keep the cars running when parts weren't available.

Although by then Mulliners was owned by the Henly's group there was still an active body and trim shop staffed by people the same age group as Vic. I learned a huge amount from them as they patiently taught me at least some of their impressive skills. I completed my apprenticeship but eventually changed career.

Fast forwarding to 2020 I proposed to my long-term partner and booked a vintage Humber wedding car. Then through the slightly disturbing magic of Google I started to get pictures of vintage cars and up popped one of Daisy.

I was instantly entranced and followed the links. She was for sale because her owner had closed his wedding business and retired to Spain taking Daisy with him. However, she was a bit big for the tiny Spanish roads so he was restoring a much smaller MGA to take back to Spain and needed to sell Daisy. I wasn't thinking about buying a vintage car but Daisy is just so pretty.

I did some research and discovered she had been rescued from a scrapyard in the 70's and had a Hooper style open tourer body built by Tony Robinson of North Stables coachbuilders. She also had a hood by Bob Peterson in Devon and box of historic receipts that reads like a *Who's Who* of the restoration world. So, I arranged to view. Inspecting Daisy really was a trip back to my apprenticeship days.

Daisy had been fitted with a modern engine and transmission but the originals with matching serial numbers were all present and part of the deal. Although this probably reduced the attraction to purists it actually suited me because I could rebuild the originals, reviving the old skills while enjoying being able to drive Daisy immediately.

The modern plant had been cleverly installed picking up the original mounts via a subframe and not causing any damage. I was sold and monies changed hands. Driving Daisy home was just such a blast. She is a real head-turner. Although I suspect that's a common Daimler effect.

Now almost four years later, with multiple jobs carried out and a list of more to be done, I have absolutely no regrets about buying Daisy. She is a delight to own and enjoy. People instinctively warm to her and she creates fun events wherever she goes!

I'm sure the gents from Mulliners would be very pleased that 'Vic's new lad' eventually became the owner of such a beautiful car and could practice the kills they so graciously taught him to take care of her and to continue the restoration work.

Spring Covid Vaccination Clinic

Thank you to all who have donated books so far. This is a valuable community resource, which we know is being enjoyed and appreciated by many.



CROFTON BEAM ENGINES – GREAT EASTER STEAM UP

Crofton Beam Engines will be open and in steam for the first time in 2025 to celebrate Easter and our great industrial heritage. Come along to see our steam engines working as they have done since 1813.

Our 1812 Boulton & Watt and 1846 Harvey Beam Engines will be doing their original job of pumping water to the summit of the Kennet & Avon Canal, keeping this very important waterway open for all. Marvel at our incredible Georgian engineering and buildings.

There is plenty to entertain everyone, adults and children alike. Marvel at our historic engines at work and talk to our knowledgeable volunteers about the history of our site and how everything works. Join in the Easter Egg Trail and Duck Race. Or make

an Easter Bonnet or bring along your own. There are prizes for completing the trail, first and last duck in the race, and best bonnet. If you are feeling energetic, you can walk from Crofton to Wilton Windmill along the old Roman Road.

AT CROFTON IN STEAM FOR 'DRIVE IT DAY'

When is 'Drive It Day'? Sunday, 27th April 2025, put it in your diary.

Why should I come? With over 300 cars visiting Crofton last year we have made the decision to fire up our boiler and run our engines for the morning and early afternoon on the day. Seeing Crofton in Steam and watching our 200-hundredyear-old engines pumping water for the Kennet and Avon Canal is a unique experience and one not to be missed. Combine this with a wonderful drive through some of Wiltshire's most beautiful countryside and you will have a day out to remember, as well as helping the NSPCC.

What is 'Drive It Day'? 'Drive It Day' was created by the Federation of British Historic Vehicle Clubs in 2005. For one day a year, historical enthusiasts and the public come together to celebrate the One Thousand Mile Trial, first organized in 1900 to celebrate the motorcar. In 2021 the Federation

partnered with NSPCC's Childline and Drive It Day has raised over £100,000 to help support vulnerable children and young people.

'The NSPCC is the leading children's charity fighting to end child abuse in the UK and Channel Islands. Using voluntary donations, which make up around 90 per cent of our funding, we help children who've been abused to rebuild their lives, we protect children at risk, and we find the best ways of preventing child abuse from ever happening again. Our Childline service provides a safe, confidential place for children with no one else to turn to, whatever their worry, whenever they need help. Children can contact Childline 24 hours a day, 7 days a week, 365 days a year.'

Crofton Beam Engines

Crofton Beam Engines sit within a Grade I listed historic site, set in the East of Wiltshire. It is home to the oldest working beam engine in the world, still in its original location, still driven by steam and which can still perform its original task of keeping the Kennet and Avon canal supplied with

water at its highest point. We have two engines which pump on 'steaming days'.

Our site will be open on 27th April from 10.00am to 4.30pm, steaming times 10.30am to 3.00pm to welcome visitors to the Grade I listed Engine House where you can see our Lancashire Boiler, several standing engines, and of course our beam engines. POLICE AND CRIME COMMISSIONER PHILIP WILKINSON'S APRIL PARISH COLUMN

Over the past few years, the issues surrounding shoplifting have become more prevalent in the news as shoplifting has become more organized and more brazen, with offenders often working in groups, seemingly not worried about being seen.

I've been told by shop managers that their staff have been assaulted when they've tried to intervene, and they are writing off thousands of pounds in stock.

My new Police and Crime Plan focuses on retail crime, and how we tackle the underlying causes and associated anti-social behaviour. This can make our main shopping centres, which should feel relaxed and inviting, less attractive and for some people, intimidating.

We also have to look at the financial costs to retail owners. For small and medium businesses, the disruption caused by shoplifting can be crippling. Whilst I know there are some people who'll say that the larger stores can afford to absorb the loss, but according to the Centre for Retail Research, shoplifting adds £133 to the cost of the average UK shopping bill each year.

In Salisbury, we have piloted a Business and Retail Crime Reduction Partnership, which links businesses with the police and local authorities, so we can build on the existing relationships we have, and foster new, stronger ties with the businesses and retailers in the city. We're now in the process of expanding the partnerships to other towns in the county.

We are also looking at ways to make it easier for businesses to report crimes to Wiltshire Police, so that a more intelligence-rich picture can be built of where the shoplifting gangs are operating and the tactics they are using.

We have also funded anti-social behaviour (ASB) wardens to be a visible presence in our largest town and city centres, and ASB hotspot funding will continue for a further year, which means there will be extra police officer and PCSO patrols in the areas deemed to be most affected by anti-social behaviour.

By taking these measures and tackling the root causes of the anti-social behaviour, which blights our commercial centres, I believe we are taking positive steps to making Wiltshire and Swindon a safer place to live and work.


